Hearing Services

What we have called “The Hearing Bus” is now being referred to as “**The Mobile Hearing Unit**” or “**The Mobile Hearing Van**” which is a small difference but acknowledges the fact that it is more than a bus. There are two Mobile Hearing Units, Unit A and Unit B. Having two units gives more flexibility throughout the state, Unit A generally in the northern part.

The units are assigned on a rotating basis for clubs in Multiple District 1. District 1 F is assigned as follows: May in 2011, June in 2012, July in 2013, August in 2014, September in 2015, and April in 2016. If you are having an event during these times and would like to have hearing screening for your community, call Mario Gumino (815 756 563 x224) at the state office. He will send the forms to request a date(s).

Some clubs have events outside the above months and would like to have a hearing screening. If a unit is not being used at the time of your event, call Mario and it may be available. However, if a club in that month's designation wants the unit, they get priority. Examples of clubs having the unit outside their assigned month: August—Lake Forest/Lake Bluff, Antioch, Palatine, and Schaumburg/Hoffman. September Schaumburg/Hoffman, Mundelein, Waukegan Uptown, Grayslake, Mt. Prospect. October—Fox Lake.

The unit is free. And there are those among you that state that, “Nothing is free.” Right you are. There are costs incurred in getting the unit to your club, in maintenance, and sometimes in motel costs for the technician. Yes, the unit is free but if your club would like to make a donation for some, or all of the costs incurred, those donations are greatly appreciated.

How can my club obtain the October Growth Award?

All clubs participating in the October Membership Growth Program will receive a banner patch as well as name recognition on a section of the Lions Clubs International Web site. Clubs qualify for recognition in two steps—by adding members in October and then reporting those members on their WMMR in October.

Any net membership growth your club achieves throughout the year brings you closer to attaining the following year end awards: Year Round Growth, President's Retention Campaign, Membership Key Award and International President's Award for Club Presidents.

As Camp Lions Coordinator for the past five years for District 1F, I have been both privileged and honored to attend the many summer camps which our District has supported and to meet with so many of the wonderfully adaptive youngsters who make up the camping population. I have been totally captivated by the counseling abilities exhibited by the young adults who have charge of the 200 plus boys and girls in the five camps each season, as well as the capable and caring passion for helping that these dedicated counselors provide for the Helen Keller Camp. If you have never attended an Open House ceremony at one of the camps, I urge you to make plans to do so in 2012. You will come away with a renewed dedication for our Camp Lions Program, and a deeper understanding for what your participation as a 1F Lion really means to those for whom WE SERVE.

This past camping season in 2011 proved highly successful. In fact, it turned out to be one of best success stories in the history of Camp Lions. The proof of that statement is demonstrated by the long line of "thank you" messages forwarded to LOIF head quarters, and communicated directly to both camp staff and Lion members of the District who attended camps. There is an old axiom that states, "When the parents are happy and satisfied, there is peace in the Lion Kingdom."

Now we are in the kickoff month of the new camping season insofar as fundraising for the 2012 camps are concerned. The critical time period for the Lions clubs in 1 F is actually September thru December.

During these four months we either create the necessary funding to fill up the five youth camp sites and the Helen Keller camp – or we consider stopping the acceptance of further camper applications at the turn of the New Year due to insufficient funds. If 2011 Candy Days don't improve beyond 2010's dismal showing, we will have an indication of what to expect beyond January 1st of 2012.

So, the challenge is not to let that be a factor. Go get the donations to the can shakers, but supplement those actions with each club putting a minimum of the sponsorship of one camper in its current budget OVER AND BEYOND Candy Day collections. **And make that donation PRIOR to the first of next year.** Can LIF count on your club to make a sponsoring commitment?

A few words about Responding to E mails and Invitations:



What is Netiquette?

Netiquette is described as “internet etiquette”. Just as Miss Manners has helped throughout the years of handwritten letters, appropriate responses and the like, our Internet friends have come up with some simple rules.

Respond: One thing that is prevalent in today’s society is delayed response time or the lack of response at all. This holds true for Lions. While some people do not live at their computers or smart phones 24/7, it is acceptable to respond to an e mail within 24 to 48 hours.

Refrain: From using “ok or thanks” to e mails. Unless you are expecting some form of response, this doesn’t add to the conversation and just clogs up your mailbox. It is acceptable to type at the top of an e mail “No Reply Necessary”.
